REFLECTION ON THE YEAR

Dear AIASF Members,

AIASF is committed to advancing the profession of architecture and design, promoting diversity, equity, and inclusion in the design and building industries while advocating for sustainability and resilience on behalf of our members and the public.

We are pleased to present the 2022 Annual Report, highlighting the accomplishments and progress made by our community in the past year.

2022 was a year of milestones and a turning point for our chapter and community. We began constructing our new Center for Architecture and Design while emerging from a historic pandemic. Amidst these extraordinary circumstances, we remained as effective as ever in our collaboration, advocacy, and advancement of the profession through a robust array of in-person, virtual, and hybrid programs.

After two years of navigating the Covid-19 pandemic, we finally got back together in person with a wonderful outdoor celebration of the Design Awards at PROXY in Hayes Valley. The excitement and energy of gathering and socializing were palpable. In June, we hosted the virtual 7th Annual Housing Forum, tackling the local housing crisis with discussion of new and pending legislation that looks like promising steps in the right direction. In November, the Design Technology Committee joined forces with Autodesk to host an all-day Design Technology Symposium to address the remarkable changes technology brings to the architectural and design professions.

At year's end, we held our first in-person annual business meeting since 2019 at the Autodesk Gallery to elect our 2023 board of directors. In his keynote address at our annual business meeting Rodney

Fong, President of the San Francisco Chamber of Commerce, discussed the role architects and the building industry can play in shaping a stronger and more resilient San Francisco. AIASF is poised to lead the conversations, actions, and collaborations to transform our downtown and prepare our city for future challenges, such as sea level rise.

We also hosted many other social and learning opportunities throughout the year to address architectural practice issues in San Francisco and the greater Bay Area. None of these accomplishments would have been possible without the dedication and commitment of our board of directors, staff, knowledge communities, and volunteers. We are grateful for their hard work and contributions.

As we look to the future, we are guided by the Strategic Business Plan, originated in 2019 and recalibrated through the pandemic, to prioritize the organization's effectiveness, resilience, and long-term growth. Town halls with the membership composed our new headquarters' fundamental values and program. A relocation committee identified a location for enhanced programming, visibility, and public accessibility.


In December, we broke ground on the Center for Architecture + Design in its new ground-floor space in the landmark Hallidie Building. We want to thank and acknowledge all AIASF member architects for contributing to the Special Assessment, which will bridge the gap between monies raised and borrowed, getting us up and running, and solvent in five years or less. The realization of this project has been many years in the making, and we couldn't have done it without the support of our members and the dedication of our board members and staff. We are excited to welcome the public to engage with us as we

discover and promote the evolving role of architecture and design in the built environment beginning in June 2023.

We want to thank all our members for your continued support and participation. If you haven't been directly involved thus far, now is the time! We invite you to join us in shaping the future of AIASF and the architectural profession we represent. Whether participating in our programs and services, joining a knowledge community, or contributing your skills and expertise, your involvement is crucial to our success. Together, we're designing and building an improved and enduring chapter to continue our legacy of membership support and community engagement.

EXPANDING THE CENTER

The coming years represent monumental growth for AIASF and the Center. The Center is envisioned as a regional hub celebrating creative-makers, community resilience, and the power of architecture + design in making life better in our city.

2022, A Year of Transition

The move into the Hallidie Building storefront is a once-in-a-lifetime opportunity for AIASF and the Center. As a physical space, the new Center for Architecture + Design will become a regional destination for professionals and the public to learn and be inspired by our built environment. As a charitable nonprofit, the move increases the Center's capacity to expand public programs and activities and reach a wider audience.

In 2021, AIASF and the Center restructured their relationship by converting the Center into a controlled subsidiary and the foundational arm of AIASF. AIASF has certain rights of control over the Center's governance as stated in the Center's new Bylaws.

In 2022, AIASF and the Center entered into a new Resource Sharing Agreement. The Center lacks the staff and operations to carry out its mission. Because of AIASF's familiarity with the Center, AIASF administers the Center's programs and operations. In exchange, the Center reimburses AIASF quarterly for staffing and overhead costs.

The Center for Architecture + Design is a 501(c)3 organization dedicated to creating a public-focused dialogue on architecture, design, and the built environment in the San Francisco Bay Area.

Founded by the American Institute of Architects, San Francisco chapter in 2005, the Center enhances public appreciation for architecture and design through virtual and in-person exhibitions, lectures, tours, film series, and other programs.

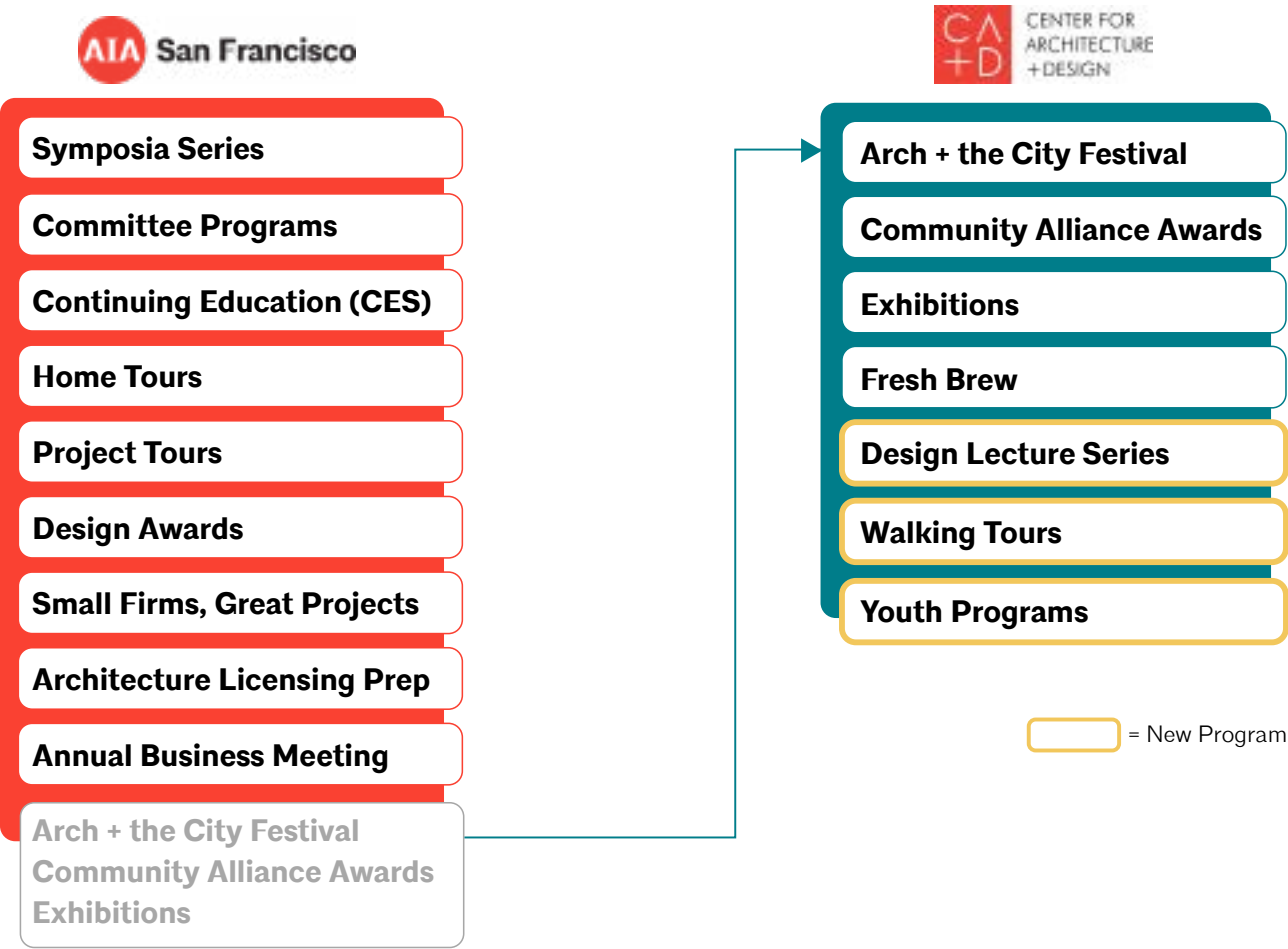

PROGRAM GROWTH

The Center’s expansion process involves developing new programs to fill its new shoes and moving programs over from AIASF that better align with the Center’s public-focused mission. These shifts began in 2021 and continue to serve as diversified revenue streams and ensure financial success for both organizations.



2022 PROGRAM HIGHLIGHTS

AIASF has put on innumerable programs – from educational lectures to community engagement events – and implemented several new initiatives to strengthen each member’s experience with the organization and as a professional.

With over 20 active Committees promoting positive engagement in the community, and leading excellent programming initiatives, AIASF was able to return to a handful of in-person programs while continuing a strong on-line presence and focusing on our facility relocation efforts.

ARCHITECTURE + THE CITY FESTIVAL

The AIASF Festival Home Tour program in collaboration with the Center for Architecture + Design was revamped to accommodate three unique programs and showcased projects in the Outer Sunset, Eureka Valley, and Noe Valley. The 19th Annual Architecture + the City Festival returned to in-person experiences which included a series of affordable housing tours featuring the Sister Lillian Murphy Community, Tahanan Supportive Housing, and Casa Adelante.

ARE PACT PROGRAM

The ARE Pact program supports dozens of members pursuing architectural licensure. Through the ARE Pact, AIASF provides participants with assignments to coach-led peer study groups, access to study materials, and admission to courses covering all aspects of the exams.

DESIGN AWARDS

AIASF's Design Awards program celebrated the best of architecture and urban design in the Bay Area on April 28, 2022 at the public open space, PROXY, in Hayes Valley for the first-in-person program of the year since the start of the pandemic. The program continued to recognize excellence in architectural work in and by the San Francisco Bay Area design community and was attended by more than 200 professionals, AIASF members, and industry affiliates. The Design Awards Jury took place online and recognized 20 projects for excellence in Architecture, Interior Architecture, Unbuilt Design, and special concentrations.

The Jury was comprised of Angela Wu, AIA, Director at Kohn Pedersen Fox; Rodolphe el-Khoury, Dean of the University of Miami School of Architecture; Sharon Johnston, FAIA, Founding Partner of Johnston Marklee and Professor in Practice at the Harvard Graduate School of Design; Nader Tehrani, recipient of the 2020 Arnold W. Brunner Memorial Prize from The American Academy of Arts and Letters and Founding Principal of NADAAA; and Marion Weiss, FAIA, co-founder of WEISS/MANFREDI and Graham Chair Professor of Practice at the University of Pennsylvania's Weitzman School of Design.

FRESH BREW

This series of online morning conversations was created to continue offering public programs during the pandemic by shifting to a virtual platform. In 2021, "Fresh Brew" covered a variety of topics with key programs including the Makers Series, Designing for Wildfire Resilience, Academy Museum of Motion Pictures, Community Resilience Strategies in California, Building Stories: Architecture on Film, Lost Department Stores of San Francisco, and many more!

HOUSING SYMPOSIUM

Already in its sixth year, the 2022 Housing Symposium, "Housing+ | Future Typologies for a Livable and Equitable San Francisco presented a two-day virtual symposium. Speakers representing organizations at the frontlines addressed San Francisco's growing population, explored ways of more livable and equitable housing opportunities for more vibrant communities in the city, and took a deep-dive into The California H.O.M.E. Act (SB9), the product of a multi-year effort to develop solutions to address the state's housing crisis. Keynote speakers included Frances Anderton, former host of KCRW public radio's "DnA: Design and Architecture" and Senator Scott Wiener who represents San Francisco and northern San Mateo County in the California State Senate.

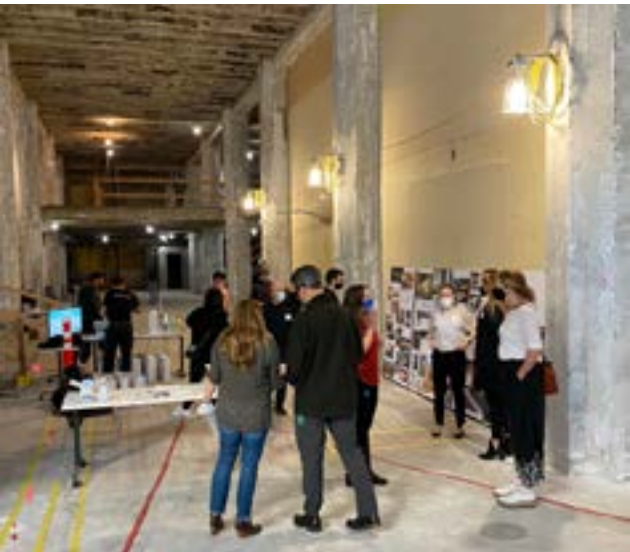
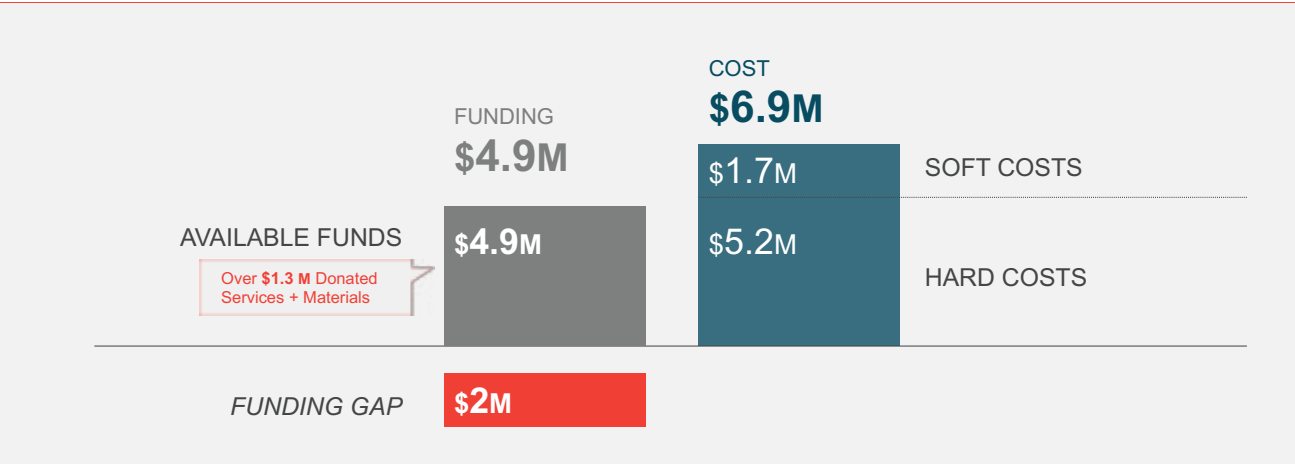

CENTER FOR ARCHITECTURE + DESIGN

Construction Budget + Loan

AIASF has identified assets and raised \$4.9M in funding sources towards the project budget of \$6.9M. AIASF has secured a construction loan to close the \$2M funding gap and will continue to fundraise to pay off the loan over the next five years. AIASF members approved the \$2M loan limit in the 2021 Annual Business Meeting.



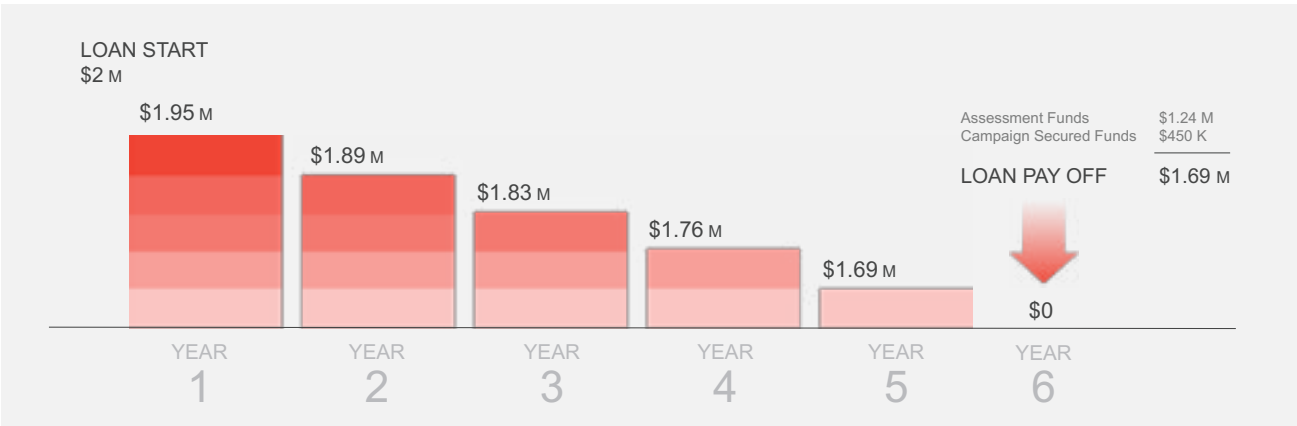

Architect Member Assessment

AIASF will repay the \$2M loan monthly using expanded operating funds over the next five years. At the end of the loan term, the balance with interest is estimated at \$1.7M and would otherwise need to be refinanced. In 2023, a special assessment will be included in renewals for Architect members at \$170 per year for up to five years. Together with secured capital campaign funds, the assessment funding will allow AIASF to pay off the loan in full after five years.

The Shape Your City Campaign launched in 2021 and continues to serve as the fundraising channel to help build the Bay Area's new Center for Architecture + Design, grow organizational capacity and expand architecture and design-focused programs for people of all ages. 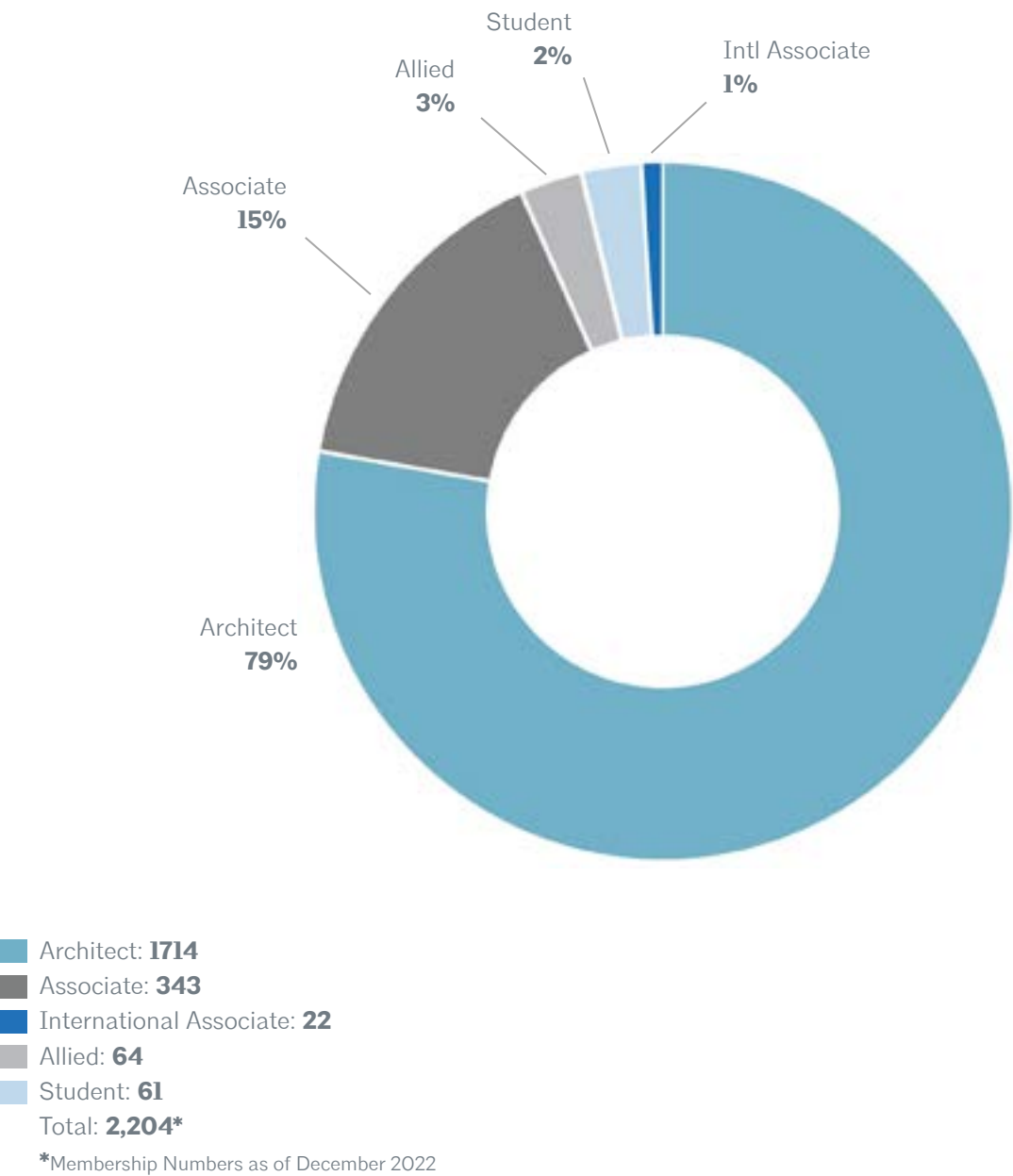

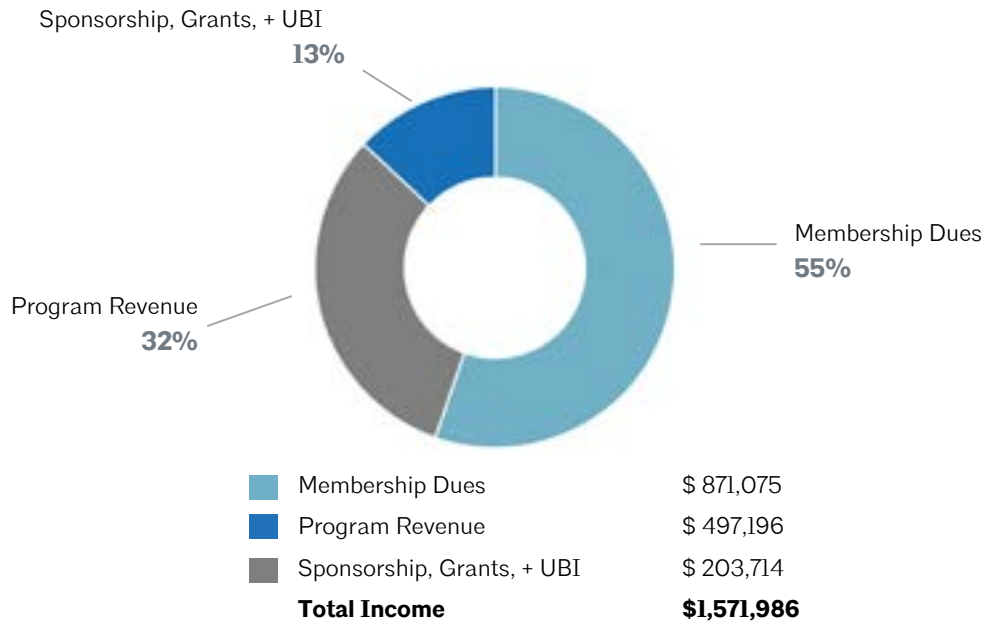

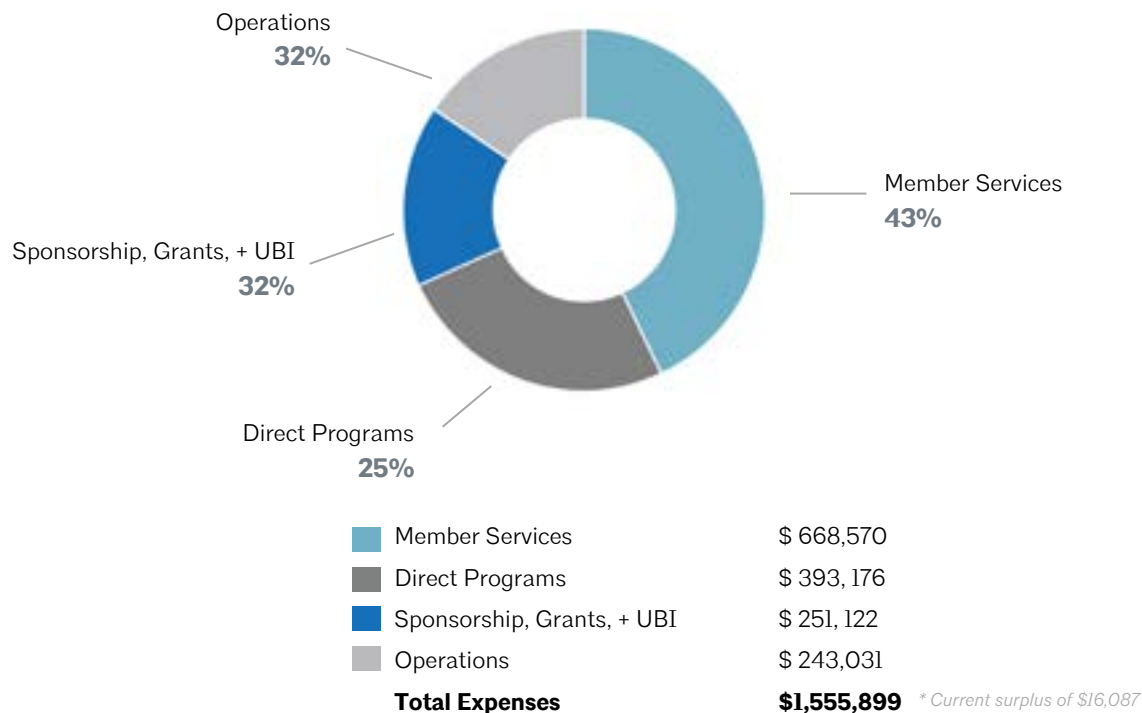

AIASF received \$112,546 in contributions towards the relocation project and \$73,962 in related expenses to be reimbursed by landlord for tenant improvements. As a result of the economic challenges from COVID-19, AIASF received two loans in 2020: 30-Year EIDL SBA loan of \$2,000,000 and a PPP loan of \$145,989. PPP loan amount was fully forgiven.

ARCHITECTURAL LICENSING COMMITTEE (ALC)

Serves as an educational resource designed to support individuals in their pursuit of licensure. The Architectural Licensing Committee (ALC) administers ARE preparatory programs.

The ARE Pact is a fast-track program to assist candidates preparing for the Architectural Registration Examination (ARE) for licensure. All ARE instructors and ARE study coaches are licensed architects and engineers providing pro-bono services. The ARE program offered 23 ARE two-hour online classes from March through November in 2022. The registrants ranged from emerging professionals to seasoned professionals who come from architectural firms and public agencies throughout the Bay Area and beyond.

BAY AREA YOUNG ARCHITECTS (BAYA)
